A strong endowment provides a secure base of resources and minimizes the need for Rinpoche's continuous fundraising.





The Endowment Funds

What is an Endowment?

An endowment is a permanent, self-sustaining source of funding. Endowment assets are invested, and each year a portion of the earnings- "endowed draw", is paid out for the purpose of the fund, while the rest is used to build



the fund's market value. In this way, an endowment fund can grow and can provide support in perpetuity.

What is the "right" size endowment?

The Ford Foundation, in its Primer for Endowment Grant makers, suggests that an organization should receive at least, and preferably more than, 10% of its operating budget from an endowment. Industry standards recommend that a financially stable organization build an endowment to several multiples of its operating budget.

How is the Healing Buddha Endowment going to be managed?

The Healing Buddha

parameters of our approved asset
allocation policy.


How is endowment income used?

Endowment income—combined with donations—makes up the gap between what it costs to meet monastery needs. This endowment income provides for essential needs and financial support for the monasteries.

What is the Healing Buddha Foundation Endowment spending policy?

The Board authorizes a payment from the endowment to be used annually to supplement the monastery operating expenses. This amount allows for the growth of the endowment while providing essential funds for the monasteries to use on an annual basis.





Invest Wisely in the Future

Our goal is to build the Healing Buddha Foundation Endowment to build the financial independence of the Monasteries Rinpoche supports, to provide for medical aftercare of young mothers and education for children. We have an initial fundraising goal of \$450,000.

In essence, building an endowment will ensure that Rinpoche has the resources to continue his teaching and his commitments to Ashi Monastery and Sera Mey Monastery, in addition to his ongoing support of Golok Monastery.

An Advisory Committee will be appointed by the Healing Buddha Foundation Board President and Treasurer to oversee the Healing Buddha Foundation Endowment. The Chair of the Advisory Committee will report to the Treasurer, who will be an ad-hoc member of the Advisory Committee.

The Fund for Ashi Monastery

The Ashi Monastery in Eastern Tibet was first built in the 1400s by the disciples of Tsongkhapa Rinpoche. It is located in the mountainous area of Kham in Eastern Tibet. It is 80 kilometers from the city of Litang. There are nineteen villages in the area served by Ashi Monastery. Because of significant limitations in transportation and resources, most Buddhist who live in this area are impoverished and incapable of providing services or making financial offerings to the monastery. Because of this, the 130 monks of Ashi Monastery face chronic difficulties in meeting their basic needs. To help alleviate this situation, more resources are urgently needed. In addition, the monastery must be renovated and expanded to meet current and projected needs.

Funding Opportunities:

- The annual cost of living for the monks.
- Renovation or rebuilding of the main meditation and teaching hall.
- Building a school with a structured curriculum for the monks.
- Constructing a Guest House for visiting teachers.

The Fund for Sera Mey Monastery

Phakyab Rinpoche has acquired the former Abbott's residence at the Sera Mey Monastery, which is currently in a state of disrepair. He has taken on the responsibility to build a community center for students from Ashi Monastery. The residence needs to be repaired to allow for a safe environment for pujas and social gatherings for the students.

Funding Opportunities:

 Significant structural renovation and repair including the walls and roof.

The Fund for Golok Monastery

Golok Monastery is the first monastery where Rinpoche studied. He still returns regularly and continues to provide support to the Tibetan students to continue their education in Tibetan language and Buddhist studies.
